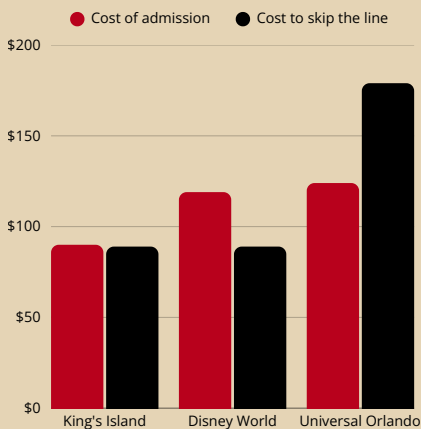


SHOULD PEOPLE BE ABLE TO PAY TO SKIP LINES?

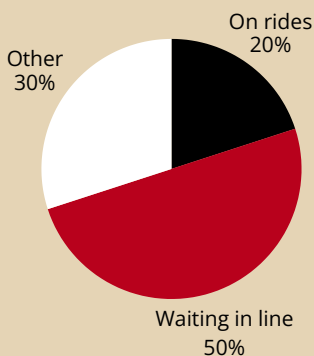
Skipping the line can cost just as much as a ticket to a park!
